He urged everyone to consider that we need to be able to offer fusion and other alternative approaches to industrializing countries, such as China, or they will rely on coal and oil, further polluting the planet.

Two-Day Seminar

During the two-day series of seminars* on October 31 and November 1, experts on the past, present, and future of fusion spoke. Most worked at PPPL at some point in their careers, and present Lab employees were delighted to renew old acquaintances. Said physicist John Johnson, who has been at the Lab since 1955, "It was great to see friends dating back to the time of Mark Heald. All the talks were good and exciting, starting with Roy Bickerton's memories of the ZETA device at Harwell, progressing through Bob Mills, Harold Eubank, and Mel Gottlieb's reminiscences of the old days, and finishing with some good discussions of the need for fusion and its future directions." Johnson was pleased to hear from Allen Boozer and Atsuo livoshi that the stellarator is well and kicking, even though Don Grove gave a delightful talk about his destruction of our [PPPL] Model C Stellarator.
