PPPL Kicks Off United Way Campaign

PPL, the University, and other employers in the area will join together to help people in the local communities through the United Way of Greater Mercer County's annual fund-raising campaign. This year's theme is "What Matters: Results You Can See." On Thursday, December 1, PPPL is hosting the annual

United Way meeting for employees at 9:30 A.M. in the MBG Auditorium. This meeting will provide information about United Way programs and will feature a presentation by one of the organizations supported by the United Way, refreshments, and a tricky-tray raffle (see list of prizes on page 2).

Pledge cards have been mailed to staff and can be dropped off at the meeting or returned to 2005 PPPL United Way Committee Chairperson Rose Fuchs at MS-38. Pledge cards need to be returned to Rose by Friday, December 16 to be included in the Grand Prize drawing.

"PPPL has always been a strong supporter of the United Way, which provides us with an opportunity to take part in building strong communities. We ask staff once again to please give generously," said Fuchs. Donations may be given as a one-time contribution or through payroll deductions. The University will contribute 15 cents per dollar for all gifts made by payroll deduction.

gifts made by payroll deduction. For all other types of donations, the University will contribute 10 cents per dollar. All donations will be distributed to United Way programs in Mercer County or employees' home communities or to other health and human services agencies that are designated by individual donors.

United Way funding is based on three focus areas — promoting health and well-being, responding to crisis, and strengthening individuals and families. Donors can choose to make general or specific

contributions. They can provide contributions that are divided among all United Way-supported programs, among all programs in an area of interest, or among all except for a particular program. With a minimum gift of \$52, they can designate a contribution to a United Way in their home community, to any specific program supported by the United Way or to any charitable health or human care organization with a 5013c tax status that is not supported by the United Way. While the historic focus of United Way is on home communities, it also is possible to direct gifts to agencies that provide health or human care in other countries. Emily Yard, a Princeton Township resident, became homeless two years ago at the age of 93. With the help of a local Meals on Wheels program and United Way, Emily was able to find an apartment, receive 2 meals a day for five days a week, and regain her sense of stability and independence. Emily continues to live in Princeton Township, and although she can only now walk with the assistance of a walker, she is very thankful for the Meals on Wheels program because it helped her to stay at home and live more independently. Emily told us that without the program she would not have known what to do, and that she would have no other way to meet her dietary needs if programs like Meals on Wheels were no longer available. There are many "Emilys" helped every day by United Way agencies.
