

We have all watched with alarm the disaster that has beset Japan. Our hearts go out to its people. Amid this tragedy, we were relieved to discover



Although our budget uncertainties seem small compared to the unknowns of the crisis in Japan, we are monitoring the unfolding budget situation closely. As you know from reading the newspapers, Congress has not yet passed a budget for the current fiscal year (FY 2011). A sixth continuing resolution passed recently. It continues government spending at the 2010 level until April 8. The resolution mandates \$6 billion in budget cuts. None affect the DOE Office of Science, which funds a wide span of scientific research, including that at PPPL. We hope that the House and Senate will reach a sensible compromise that funds our government for 2011.

The University is part of a large effort to convey the strong message that cutting scientific research would have a very negative impact on our nation's leading scientific facilities and research of critical importance to our security and long-term economic prosperity. This is particularly true of the type of research that we perform at PPPL which we believe is integral to the country's economic future. I will keep you posted on budget developments as they unfold.
